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# 1. Introduction

## 1. About EIT Food - Vision and focus

### 3. Description of the subject matter of the call

#### 1. Purpose and scope of activities

This call has the objective of recruiting participants to deliver the Finland Resilient Agriculture Landscape as part of the EIT Food landscape portfolio.

The Finland Resilient Agriculture Landscape is focused on enhancing southern Finland's agroecosystems through soil function preservation and restoration to increase farm resilience, improve regional water quality, reduce flood risk and strengthen habitats vital for the Baltic Sea. The Landscape will bring supply chain resilience by transitioning land to regenerative agriculture over 3 agricultural years from 2027-29, setting a foundation for continued progress in the region beyond the initial 3 years.

To achieve its goals within this landscape approach, the coalition aims to deliver significant outcomes across environmental, economic, and social dimensions. This will involve developing robust methodologies through various work packages to ensure the project's desired contributions are met. These contributions focus on several key areas, including achieving additional carbon removal per hectare, a significant reduction in the use of mineral fertilization and insecticides, and ensuring a stable or increased profit margin at the farm group level. Furthermore, the project is expected to benefit a substantial number of farmers through knowledge sharing, both within the immediate project group and the broader farming community. Success will also be measured by the number of hectares brought under the de-risking mechanism and the development of actionable recommendations for regional stakeholders to accelerate the adoption of regenerative agriculture principles.

Applications should be from complete consortia including parties responsible for all work packages. A single organisation can deliver more than one work package if they demonstrate sufficient capability:

#### Work Package 1 – Project Management, Coordination and Communication Services

This WP should be delivered by one organisation with strong connection to the Finnish agricultural ecosystem. This organisation is the lead partner, responsible for submitting the application on behalf of the whole consortium. This work package involves:

#### **A. Governance and Coordination**

- Support the implementation of a shared governance framework to enable aligned decision-making, issue resolution, and accountability across EIT Food, corporate partners, farms, and consortium members.
- Coordinate field-level entities responsible for in-field delivery, ensuring consistency across corporate supplier networks and agronomist teams.
- Facilitate regular coordination meetings and structured information flows across partners.

#### **B. Implementation Oversight and Alignment**

- Monitor delivery of technical assistance to ensure alignment with the consortia's guidelines.
- Ensure technical assistance is efficiently deployed across participating suppliers and agronomists within each corporate network.
- Performance management and progress tracking against agreed workplans, milestones, and KPIs, escalating risks and proposing corrective actions where needed.
- Support alignment between field-level implementation and broader landscape objectives.

#### **C. Impact Measurement and Reporting**

- Coordinate data collection and reporting across field-level entities to support robust, consistent impact measurement.
- Consolidate inputs into landscape-level reporting aligned with EIT Food standards and corporate partners' annual reporting requirements.
- Ensure delivery of data collected and measured to each corporate member according to their reporting requirements, allowing integration in overall corporate MRV.
- Develop the Reporting Framework and support transparent reporting of progress, outcomes, and lessons learned.

#### **D. Communications and Visibility**

- Develop and implement a shared communication framework delivering consistent messaging across partners.
- Support internal and external communications, including updates, case studies, and learning outputs.
- Ensure visibility of results within the EIT Food portfolio and across relevant European platforms and networks.

#### **E. Strategic Advisory and Program Design**

- Provide strategic guidance on farmer transitions, ensuring fairness, transparency, and farmer confidence and agency throughout the 3-year programme.
- Advise on appropriate transition pathways, including interim or hybrid models that balance risk between farmers and other stakeholders in the landscape.
- Recommend engagement opportunities with local entities (i.e. banks, government stakeholders, technology providers, input providers) where opportunities to drive efficiency, create impact and improve coordination exist.

#### *Work Package 2 – Training and Advisory Services*

This WP focuses on delivering targeted agronomic training and advisory services to support farmer's transition to regenerative agriculture, using a farm level approach. Advisory support must be locally relevant, climate-risk informed, landscape risk related and aligned with regenerative practices and transition pathways. This WP includes:

#### **A. Farmer training**

- Adapt a comprehensive, scientifically grounded agronomic support tailored to the specific farming systems and local conditions of Southern Finland. This includes conducting an initial context analysis for each participating farm to identify priorities and jointly creating a tailor-made action plan.
- Develop a three-year training programme for enrolled farms that responds to farm specific priorities and designed to address broader landscape scale challenges.
- Implement a multi-format training schedule that combines group learning on identified needs with personalized on-farm support. This will involve at least one individual agronomic support visit per farm each year to review and update the action plan, complemented by two on-field workshops annually for the cohort.

#### **B. Building capabilities**

- Implement a digitalized farm level tool that enables farms to plan, assess, and drive sustained system change over the long term. The tool should support farm empowerment. Facilitate the creation of smaller, local farmer groups to encourage knowledge exchange, collaborative problem solving, and mutual support. This includes organizing peer-to-peer farm visits and an annual review forum to share results, celebrate successes, and provide feedback for program improvement.

#### *Work Package 3 – Connecting hub*

This WP aims to design, develop, and launch a digital platform that serves as the central hub for knowledge exchange and collaboration within the landscape programme and beyond. It seeks to establish a network to foster peer-to-peer learning and expertise sharing.

- Adapt or create and deploy a digital platform, accessible as a website, to provide open-access content and resources for all Finnish farmers, actively leveraging existing open-access materials.
- Integrate key functionalities within the platform, including:
  - A resource library for the storage and easy retrieval of technical documents, best practices, e-learning, tools, and relevant contents.
  - A discussion forum to facilitate interactive communication and knowledge sharing among users.
  - An interactive calendar to list and publicize events such as trainings, field day, etc.

Develop and execute a strategy to grow the hub's user base and maintain the continuity of its operations beyond the initial funding period.

#### *Work Package 4 – Transition de-risking mechanism*

This WP aims to design, pilot, and scale financial mechanisms that mitigate the risks farmers face when transitioning to regenerative agriculture, thereby encouraging broader adoption.

- In collaboration with local organizations and based on both farmers' priorities and landscape challenges, design a financial mechanism to de-risk the transition at the farm level. The initial focus will be on exploring parametric insurance as a potential solution, but the project will remain open to evaluating and proposing alternative or complementary de-risking instruments if they are more appropriate for the local context. This will result in a comprehensive offer detailing the design and terms of the proposed product.

- Develop a detailed plan for, and execute a pilot of the selected financial mechanism within the enrolled farmers group for two years. This includes managing all operational aspects of the pilot, from farmer onboarding and contract management to claims processing, and conducting an annual review of the pilot's performance.
- Collect and analyse data on the uptake, effectiveness, and financial viability of the piloted mechanism. Based on this analysis and feedback from participating farmers, develop a comprehensive plan for refining and scaling the most successful mechanism to a wider audience of farmers across the region.

#### Work Package 5 – Soil carbon removal MRV

This WP focuses on establishing a robust and credible system for measuring, reporting, and verifying soil carbon impacts resulting from regenerative agriculture practices.

- Propose and validate a Soil Carbon Removal MRV methodology that combines direct soil sampling, advanced modelling, and remote sensing data to ensure both accuracy and scalability. The methodology must be designed to comply with GHG Protocol and SBTi FLAG guidelines while including local specificities. A key component of this activity is the development of a clear plan for quantifying uncertainty in the results.
- Implement the validated carbon removal model across the cohort of participating farms. This involves collection farm management data and soil physico-chemical characteristics to estimate Soil Organic Carbon (SOC) sequestration rates and overall evolution from the established baseline. Data would need to be integrated into an existing MRV platform.

## 2. Main requirements for applicants

Applications should be from a full consortium able to meet requirements of all work packages. Please note, consortium members can be responsible for more than one WP. The application should be submitted by the Consortium Lead Partner/Activity Leader.

#### WP1 – Project Management, Coordination and Communications

Role: Coordinate and manage landscape-level governance, partner collaboration, implementation oversight, communications, and reporting to ensure aligned delivery, accountability, and visibility of outcomes.

#### WP2 - Training and Advisory Services

Role: Lead the design and delivery of farmer training and agronomic advisory services, while building the capacity of local suppliers' and aggregators' agronomists to enable scalable, long-term regenerative agriculture support.

#### WP3 – Connecting Hub

Role: Lead the design, development, and management of a central digital platform and network to foster knowledge exchange, collaboration, and peer-to-peer learning among farmers, advisors, and other stakeholders within the Finnish agricultural ecosystem.

#### WP4 – Transition De-Risking Mechanisms

Role: Lead the design, piloting, and scaling of innovative financial mechanisms, such as parametric insurance products, to mitigate the economic risks faced by farmers during their transition to regenerative agriculture, thereby encouraging wider adoption.

#### WP5 – Soil Carbon Removal MRV

Role: Lead the design, deployment, and operation of a robust MRV approach to measure, verify, and report carbon removal outcomes at farm level, with a primary focus on Soil Organic Carbon (SOC). This includes developing a scalable methodology compliant with international standards (GHG Protocol, SBTi FLAG), implementing a carbon estimation model, and establishing a credible third-party verification protocol.

### 3. Main requirements for project implementation

#### 3.1. Project duration and implementation

The project will run from November 2026 through three cropping years (2027–2029).

Subject to the availability of funding and the partners demonstrating satisfactory performance, the project may be extended beyond this initial period.

The project must comply with gender equality, diversity and inclusion principles in line with Annex 5 of the Horizon Europe Model Grant Agreement, Specific Rules, Values) and the [EIT Gender Equality Policy and Action Plan 2025-2027](#).

#### 3.2. Deliverables

Grant recipients must submit project deliverables. For this activity the deliverables include:

##### WP1 – Project Management

- Reporting - annual reporting to EIT Food including costs, KPIs and deliverables
- Communications – develop and implement communications and dissemination strategy, including creation of materials. This includes disseminating to the Finnish ecosystem.

##### Work Package 2 – Training and Advisory Services

- Training – initial farm context analysis and co-creation of tailored action plan for each participating farm. Structure a training plan over the three years addressing farm-level priorities and landscape challenges and deliver agronomic training and advisory services
- Building capabilities – facilitate local farmer groups, including peer-to-peer exchanges and annual forums.
- Reporting – annual report on farmer progress, adoption of practices and tools, including summary of training activities, on-farm advisory visits, farmer engagement, and iterative improvements.

##### WP3 – Connecting Hub

- Design – Adapt existing solutions or, if necessary, create a new one, to serve as a dynamic digital platform (website). This hub will provide open-access content populated in resources library, a discussion forum to facilitate knowledge sharing and a listing of farming events across Finland. The proposal should justify the chosen approach (adaptation vs. new build) based on functionality, scalability, and cost-effectiveness.
- Reporting – annual report on user growth, engagement metrics, and key community insights.

Continuation – a recommendation detailing plans for user acquisition, retention, moderation, hosting, content strategy, and long-term operational sustainability beyond the initial funding period.

##### WP4 – Transition De-Risking Mechanisms

- Design – build an innovative financial product, including structure, triggers, coverage, pricing logic, and terms aligned with farmer needs and landscape challenges.
- Implementation – develop and implement an operational plan for the two years pilot, covering farmer onboarding, contracts, data requirements, governance, and claims management process.
- Evaluation – provide annual results analysis, including farmer feedback, risk reduction performance, and economic viability.
- Scaling-up: refine the transition finance mechanism based on implementation feedback and lessons learned; develop practical guidelines for adapting and extending it to a wider farmer base across the region; and propose a pathway to sustain the mechanism beyond the end of the landscape project.

#### WP5 – Soil Carbon Removal MRV

- Methodology – provide a comprehensive document detailing the validated methodology for quantifying and verifying soil carbon removal, including the approach for handling uncertainty.
- Results – share key results to all the stakeholders based on the agreed allocation, including the baseline SOC levels and the ongoing evolution of soil carbon for the farm cohort.

#### Overall Project Outcomes

In addition to the work package-specific deliverables, the project is expected to contribute to the following indicative outcomes. Applicants should propose indicative outcome parameters, including realistic assumptions, example ranges, measurement methods, reporting approaches, and relevant workplan steps.

At application stage, applicants are expected to show relevant expertise and provide realistic assumptions or example ranges where possible, recognising that a full set of baselines and measurements may not yet be available and that final parameters may depend on the selected farm cohort, available data, partner requirements, and inception findings.

Final targets, baselines, indicators, and reporting requirements will be refined during the inception phase in consultation with EIT Food, partners, and selected consortium members.

#### Environmental Outcomes:

- Additional carbon removal per hectare, with indicative target parameters and proposed baseline and uncertainty approach.
- Reduction in mineral fertiliser use, with indicative target parameters and proposed measurement approach.
- Reduction in insecticide application, with indicative target parameters and proposed measurement approach.

#### Economic and Social Outcomes:

- Stable or increased farm-level profit margins, with indicative parameters and proposed assessment approach.
- Number of farmers benefiting from the project's knowledge, within the project group and broader farmer community, with indicative reach parameters.
- Number of hectares under the de-risking mechanism, with indicative target parameters and proposed eligibility assumptions.

#### Policy Outcomes:

- Actionable recommendations for regional stakeholders designed to unlock and accelerate the adoption of regenerative agriculture principles within broader communities, based on evidence generated through implementation.

### 3.4. Monitoring and reporting

The project will be monitored and may be audited. All Activities selected for funding undergo continuous monitoring by EIT Food to ensure effective progress and implementation in accordance with the Project Agreement.

EIT Food may request regular reporting of actual costs incurred with the subgrant, as well as regular reporting of KPIs and deliverables, together with the supporting documentation. The monitoring process may result in an amendment to the Activity workplan and/or budget, however the Financial Return Mechanism Agreement cannot be re-negotiated following the approval of the Activity.

In the case of under-performance, significant delay of implementation, misconduct, misalignment with the project specifications in the grant management system or any other reason jeopardizing the timely implementation of the Activity identified during the monitoring process, EIT Food reserves the right to discontinue or restructure the funding of the Activity at any point during the Activity duration.

A formal ex-post impact assessment within at least five years of the end of the activity and its outputs is required for each activity, including those implemented by third parties.

## 4. Financial aspects of the call

### 1. KIC funding and cost eligibility

The total budget for this call is €1,100,000. Recipients will receive a subgrant to fund their cost.

The maximum funding available for that period per application is €1,100,000 (actual costs).

The project runs from November 2026 to December 2029.

This funding is implemented under EIT GA 101269771. There is a 6 million EUR limit per participant from Member States of the European Union (EU) and from [Horizon Europe Associate Countries](#) for the whole 3-year Grant Agreement. Legal entities from non-Horizon Europe Associate countries can participate in consortia but are limited to funding of 60 000 over 3 years for a Grant Agreement. In those limits are included all the EIT Funding awarded to an organization across all the activities and prizes for the 3-year grant agreement.

The Subgrant is based on actual costs and value for money. All costs, including co-funding, need to comply with Horizon Europe regulations regarding the eligibility of expenses. Please refer to Article 6 of the [Model Grant Agreement](#) and the [Annotated Model Grant Agreement](#).

In addition to the guidance provided by Horizon Europe, the proposals must comply with the following maximum thresholds:

- Subcontracting can amount to a maximum of 20% of total costs.

Participants are not permitted to give a subgrant to another third party.

When subcontracting, participants must comply with the Horizon Europe procurement rules, particularly the principles of fair competition, equal treatment and avoidance of conflicts of interest.

## 2. Payment arrangements

EIT Food will disburse funding in instalments. A proportion of the Activity budget will be pre-financed based on the company size, with subsequent annual payments linked to the eligible costs reported by the recipient.

## 3. Financial sustainability requirements

Like other initiatives within the [EIT Food Resilient Innovation Portfolio](#), this project is based on a co-investment model that brings together public and corporate funding through strategic matchmaking. EIT Food provides catalytic funding, which is matched and ideally exceeded by contributions from participating corporates.

## 5. Call criteria

Following the deadline for submission, the admissibility, eligibility, exclusion and selection criteria checks will be performed for each proposal in line with the following criteria.

### 1. Admissibility

Please note that completing the following two steps is a mandatory prerequisite for submitting an application for EIT Food Calls.

- First, applicants must register their organisation on the [EU Funding & Tenders Portal](#) in order to obtain a unique nine-digit Participant Identification Code (PIC); if unsure whether a PIC already exists, organisations can verify their registration directly via the [EU Portal](#).
- Second, applicants must register, access and complete their submission through the platform [MyEITFood.eu](#).

Only proposals complying with the following conditions will be considered admissible for further evaluation:

Applications must be submitted in English before the call deadline, submitted using the forms provided inside [MyEITFood.eu](#), complete and contain all parts and mandatory annexes and supporting documents.

**Any proposals submitted after the deadline will be inadmissible.**

**Equal opportunity:** The call is open to all applicants, including those without an existing partnership agreement with EIT Food. All members of the KIC Partnership (as defined in the Partnership Agreement) shall have equal opportunity to participate in this funding opportunity.

2. Entities eligible to participate and eligibility for funding

Any legal entity, regardless of its place of establishment, including legal entities from non-associated third countries is eligible to participate, provided that the conditions laid down in the Horizon Europe Regulation have been met (e.g. the entity is not under EU sanction, please refer to annex 2 and 3), along with any other conditions laid down in the specific call/topic.

For this call, a ‘legal entity’ means legal person created and recognised as such under national law, EU law or international law, which has legal personality and which may, acting in its own name, exercise rights and be subject to obligations, or an entity without legal personality.

In accordance with the Horizon Europe Work Programme 2025<sup>1</sup>, in order to be eligible for funding, the applicant must be established in one of the eligible countries, i.e.:

- the Member States of the European Union, including their outermost regions;
- the Overseas Countries and Territories (OCTs) linked to the Member States<sup>2</sup>;
- countries associated to Horizon Europe<sup>3</sup>;
- certain low- and middle-income countries<sup>4</sup>.
- Legal entities, which are established in countries not listed above will be eligible for funding if their participation is considered essential for implementing the action by the EIT.

Only proposals satisfying all the eligibility criteria shall pass on to the selection and evaluation stages.

3. Consortium composition

Only legal entities forming a consortium are eligible to participate in the actions provided that the consortium includes, as beneficiaries, at least two legal entities independent from each other and established in the eligible countries.

4. Award criteria

4.1. Award criteria, subcriteria and maximum scores

The following criteria and weighting will be used in the assessment:

### 2. Evaluation of proposals

All submitted applications will undergo an eligibility check and evaluation to determine their feasibility and suitability for funding opportunity.

During the eligibility check, if EIT Food identifies obvious or technical errors in a proposal, applicant will have the opportunity to correct or resubmit their proposal within three (3) calendar days following the call submission deadline. Such errors may include system malfunctions, typos, or missing supporting documents.

The correction window is intended to ensure that these issues do not unduly affect the evaluation of otherwise eligible proposals. Please note that this opportunity is strictly limited to rectifying technical errors and does not permit substantive modifications to the proposal content.

The evaluation will be conducted by 3 external evaluators and 1 internal evaluator, based on the criteria specified in section 5.4.1 (Award criteria, subcriteria and maximum scores). External evaluators score the award criteria Excellence, Quality and Efficiency of Implementation and Impact. Internal evaluators only score Strategic Fit. The internal evaluator score does not outweigh the external assessment.

The evaluation consists of a remote evaluation phase where internal and external evaluators conduct their assessment based on the stated criteria, followed by an interview with the same evaluators to clarify any outstanding questions. Evaluators have the possibility to revisit their scores given at remote evaluation phase after the panel.

Only the top three highest-scoring applications will be invited to an interview.

All external evaluators have been selected in an open and transparent process. All evaluators, both internal and external, are trained extensively on the European Union's Code of Conduct for Evaluators, namely on the importance of transparency, fair treatment of all applicants, confidentiality and how to avoid conflict of interest. Evaluators must contractually agree to recuse themselves in the event of a conflict of interest. EIT Food aims for representation of either women or men not falling below 40% as a parity threshold within evaluation committees.

Expert evaluators are obliged to use the [Horizon Dashboard](#) during the assessment and to provide evidenced justification on the assessment of the proposal's budgets.

### 3. Communication of evaluation results to applicants

#### 3.1. Communication of evaluation results

Following the award decision, all applicants shall be informed of the result in writing. All applicants shall receive their assessment, in the format of evaluation summary report, including their score.

In case an applicant requests further clarification regarding the evaluation result, it may contact the KIC by email. Such requests will be replied within 15 days (this deadline may be extended by the KIC with due justification).

Successful proposals will be invited to the financial support agreement preparation stage/onboarding, the other proposals will be rejected.

#### 3.2. Requirements for selected proposals

If the proposal is selected, the communication on the evaluation results may include a set of recommendations/conditions as a result of the outcome of the evaluation. These requirements may not entail a substantial modification of the proposal.

If the applicant fails to comply with the provided recommendations/conditions or does not respond in the time allocated, the EIT Food reserves the right to withdraw the conditional notification. Should this occur, the next proposal will be contacted following the ranking list.

Entities that have never been part of projects funded by the EIT Food and that do not have a PIC validated by the Research Executive Agency (REA) of the European Commission will be subject to a PIC validation process.

As part of the onboarding process, selected entities must:

- Sign and submit the Declaration of Size.
  - Sign and submit the Financial Information Form.
  - Register on EIT Food grants management platform.
  - Additionally, EIT Food reserves the right to request the EIT Community Onboarding Service a Financial Assessment Capacity to check the financial capacity of any entity of a selected proposal. In such case, EIT Food may require:
    - an enhanced financial responsibility regime, i.e. joint and several liability for all subgrantees or joint and several liabilities of Affiliated Entities if any
    - prefinancing paid in instalments (multiple/additional prefinancing)
    - (one or more) prefinancing guarantees
- or
- propose no prefinancing or
  - request that the entity be replaced or, if needed, might reject the entire proposal

In other words, if the assessment results are not satisfactory, EIT Food might reject the participation of this entity and will then check whether the proposal is still eligible.

#### 3.3. Standstill period

The standstill period is a set time after funding selection for appeals, final administrative checks, and compliance in the award process.

Applicants can submit an appeal within 15 days of receiving their result, if the evaluation of their proposal has not been carried out in accordance with the procedures set out in this document.

## Annexes

### 1. Annex 1 - Information on the EIT

#### 1. European Institute of Innovation and Technology

The European Institute of Innovation and Technology (EIT) is a **European Union body** with a legal personality and a wide legal capacity accorded to legal persons under national law. The EIT was created in 2008 by the European Union (EU) to enhance Europe's global competitiveness by fostering collaboration between businesses, research institutions, and higher education organizations.

The EIT is governed by [Regulation \(EU\) 2021/695](#) (EIT Regulation), which aligns the EIT's mission with the EU's priorities and the objectives of Horizon Europe on evolving research, innovation, economic growth, job creation, global competitiveness, sustainable growth, higher education and entrepreneurship, by means of the Knowledge and Innovation Communities (KICs), which address specific societal challenges and are established and supported by the EIT.

The [EIT Strategic Innovation Agenda \(SIA\) 2021-2027](#) is aligned with Horizon Europe and lays down the priority fields and the strategy of the EIT for future initiatives, capacity to generate the best innovation added-value, objectives, key actions, mode of operation, expected results, impact, as well as an estimate of the resources needed for the duration of Horizon Europe.

Horizon Europe Regulation

The [Horizon Europe Regulation \(EU\) 2021/695](#) foresees that the EIT takes part in the implementation of the Horizon Europe Programme in accordance with its strategic objectives for the period 2021 to 2027, as laid down in the Strategic Innovation Agenda of the EIT, and taking into account the strategic planning of Horizon Europe.

EIT and Knowledge and Innovation Community (KIC) relations

The EIT Regulation defines KICs as large-scale Institutionalised European Partnerships of higher education institutions, research organisations, companies and other stakeholders in the innovation process in the form of a strategic network, regardless of its legal form, based on joint mid- to long-term innovation planning to meet the EIT's challenges and contribute to attaining the objectives established.

According to the EIT Regulation, and without prejudice to the partnership agreements and grant agreements between the EIT and each KIC, the KICs have substantial autonomy to establish their internal organisation and composition, as well as their agenda and working methods, provided that they result in progress towards achieving the objectives of the EIT and the KICs, taking into account the strategic planning of Horizon Europe and the strategic direction of the EIT set out in the SIA and by the Governing Board.

#### 2. Contractual framework between the EIT and the KICs

The long-term relations between the EIT and each KIC are based on a **seven-year Partnership Agreement (PA)**<sup>5</sup> laying down the general terms and conditions under which the KIC operates as an Institutionalised European Partnership. Subject to positive performance, interim review and outcome of comprehensive assessment of the KIC, the PA can be extended for another period of a maximum of seven years.

The EIT signed a framework partnership agreement with EIT Food on 1 March 2018, with retroactive effect as of 1 January 2018.

The **Grant Agreement** (GA)<sup>6</sup> is the contractual instrument laying down the provisions concerning the implementation of the KIC activities (KIC Business Plan, Cross-KIC activities, etc.) through grants, on an annual or multi-annual basis of up to three years with the KICs. Business plans describe the main objectives and expected results and actions taken by the KICs.

The Grant Agreement 2026-2028 between the EIT and EIT Food entered into force on April 7<sup>th</sup> 2026, with effect from the action start date of 1 January 2026.

Contractual framework between the KIC and the subgrantees

In accordance with the Grant Agreement (Annex 5), the KIC launches calls (i.e. open calls or KIC partnership calls) in order to select projects or award prizes. The KIC awards a “financial support to third parties” (i.e. the so called “subgrants” and “prizes”) for the implementation of these projects and signs **subgrant agreements** (“Financial Support Agreements”) with the selected entities or consortia.

## 2. Annex 2 - EU restrictions on participation

### 1. EU restrictive measures

Entities subject to EU restrictive measures under Article 29 of the Treaty on the European Union (TEU) and Article 215 of the Treaty on the Functioning of the EU (TFEU)<sup>7</sup> as well as Article 75 TFEU<sup>8</sup>, are not eligible to participate in any capacity, including as beneficiaries, affiliated entities, associated partners, third parties giving in-kind contributions, subcontractors or recipients of financial support to third parties (if any).

Special rules also apply to entities covered by Commission Guidelines No 2013/C 205/0522<sup>9</sup>.

### 2. Legal entities established in Russia, Belarus, or in non-government controlled territories of Ukraine

Given the illegal invasion of Ukraine by Russia and the involvement of Belarus, there is currently no appropriate context allowing the implementation of the actions foreseen in this programme with legal entities established in Russia, Belarus, or in non-government controlled territories of Ukraine. Therefore, even where such entities are not subject to EU restrictive measures, such legal entities are not eligible to participate in any capacity. This includes participation as beneficiaries, affiliated entities, associated partners, third parties giving in-kind contributions, subcontractors or recipients of financial support to third parties (if any). Exceptions may be granted on a case-by-case basis for justified reasons.

With specific regard to measures addressed to Russia, following the adoption of the Council Regulation (EU) 2024/1745 of 24 June 2024<sup>10</sup> (amending Council Regulation (EU) No 833/2014 of 31 July 2014) concerning restrictive measures in view of Russia’s actions destabilising the situation in Ukraine, legal entities established outside Russia but whose proprietary rights are directly or indirectly owned for more than 50% by a legal person, entity or body established in Russia are also not eligible to participate in any capacity.

### 3. Measures for the protection of the Union budget against breaches of the principles of the rule of law in Hungary

Following the [Council Implementing Decision \(EU\) 2022/2506](#), as of 16 December 2022, no legal commitments can be entered into with Hungarian public interest trusts established under the Hungarian Act IX of 2021 or any entity they maintain. Affected entities may continue to apply to calls for proposals and can participate without receiving EU funding, as associated partners, if allowed by the call conditions. However, as long as the Council measures are not lifted, such entities are not eligible to participate in any funded role (beneficiaries, affiliated entities, subcontractors, recipients of financial support to third parties, etc.). In case of multi-beneficiary grant calls, applicants will be invited to remove or replace that entity in any funded role and/or to change its status into associated partner. Tasks and budget may be redistributed accordingly.

### 4. Restrictions for the protection of European communication networks

The protection of European communication networks has been identified as an important security interest of the Union and its Member States<sup>11</sup>. For further information, please refer to the Horizon Europe, Work Programme 2025, General Annexes, B – Eligibility on page 14<sup>12</sup>.

## 3. Annex 3 - Exclusion criteria

Applicants will be excluded from participation in the Call and from the award if they are in one of the situations referred to in Article 138(1) of the EU Financial Regulation. Applicants that are subject to EU administrative sanctions (i.e. exclusion) or are in one of the following exclusion situations that bar them from receiving EU grants can NOT participate:

- bankruptcy, winding up, affairs administered by the courts, arrangement with creditors, suspended business activities or other similar procedures (including procedures for persons with unlimited liability for the applicant's debts);
- they are in breach of social security or tax obligations (including if done by persons with unlimited liability for the applicant's debts);
- they are guilty of grave professional misconduct (including if done by persons having powers of representation, decision-making or control, beneficial owners or persons who are essential for the award/implementation of the grant);
- they are guilty of fraud, corruption, having links to a criminal organisation, money laundering, terrorism-related crimes (including terrorism financing), child labour or human trafficking (including if done by persons having powers of representation, decision-making or control, beneficial owners or persons who are essential for the award/implementation of the grant);
- they have shown significant deficiencies in complying with their main obligations under an EU procurement contract, grant agreement, prize, expert contract, or similar (including if done by persons having powers of representation, decision-making or control, beneficial owners or persons who are essential for the award/implementation of the grant);
- they are guilty of irregularities within the meaning of Article 1(2) of Regulation No 2988/9534 (including if done by persons having powers of representation, decision making or control, beneficial owners or persons who are essential for the award/implementation of the grant); or
- they have created under a different jurisdiction an entity with the intent to circumvent fiscal, social or other legal obligations in the country of origin or created another entity with this purpose (including if done by persons having powers of representation, decision-making or control, beneficial owners or persons who are essential for the award/implementation of the grant).

- have misrepresented the information required as a condition for participating in the procedure or have failed to supply that information; or
- were previously involved in the preparation of documents used in the award procedure where this entails a breach of the principle of equality of treatment, including distortion of competition, that cannot be remedied otherwise.

As evidence, the applicants (i.e. the Coordinator and all the proposed partners participating in the applicant consortium) will have to submit a **declaration of honour on exclusion criteria and absence of conflict of interest**. Failure to provide adequate documentation may result in the exclusion of the applicants concerned.

Successful applicants will go through the legal entity validation process of the **Onboarding Service of the KICs (i.e. a shared service led by EIT Urban Mobility KIC)**. If not provided in the application, the Onboarding Service will request registration documents and a signed Declaration of honour from the successful applicant. The validation may also include a check of the successful applicants by the EIT in the Early Detection and Exclusion System (EDES) of the European Commission.

## 4. Annex 4 – Other terms and conditions

### 1. Acceptance of the call conditions

EIT Food reserves the right to make reasonable amendments and additions to the call conditions. Amendments and additions to the call conditions shall be valid only before the submission deadline, and if made available to all potential applicants at the same time on the call page of the [EIT Food Calls webpage](#).

EIT Food may declare the call unsuccessful in case no applications are received, if the applications do not meet the admissibility, eligibility, exclusion and selection criteria, or if none of the applications reach the thresholds laid down in this call text.

By submitting the application form, the applicant agrees to the present call conditions. Applicants agree that they have no legal entitlement to funding.

### 2. Cancellation of the call

EIT Food reserves the right to cancel the call at any time before the signature of the Financial Support Agreement(s) without the obligation to compensate applicants, in particular where its objectives can no longer be met, provided that the applicants are informed in a transparent manner in writing as follows:

- if the cancellation takes place before that award: on the call page of the [EIT Food Calls webpage](#),
- if the cancellation takes place following the communication of the results to the applicants, during the standstill period, or anytime before the signature of the Financial Support Agreement: in writing directly to the selected applicants.

### 3. Data protection

EIT Food ensures that any processing of personal data shall be performed in accordance with Regulation (EU) 2016/679 of the European Parliament and of the Council of 27 April 2016, on the protection of natural persons with regard to the processing of personal data and on the free movement of such data, and in accordance with Directive 95/46/EC (General Data Protection Regulation). As a data subject, you have the right of access, the right to rectification, the right to erasure, the right to restrict processing, the right to data portability, the right to object, and the right not to be subject to a decision based solely on automated processing.

The collected personal data will be used solely for the evaluation of the applications and the conduct of the call process.

Personal data will be deleted 5 years after the announcement of the results of the call in case of unsuccessful applications and 7 years for successful applicants.

By submitting your application to this call, you consent that EIT Food will collect, transfer, process, store, and delete your data in accordance with the aforementioned conditions.

#### 4. Confidentiality

EIT Food undertakes to use any confidential information shared by the applicants solely for the purposes of the evaluation process.

Confidential information shall mean data and/or information (in any form) that is proprietary to, or possessed by, the applicants and not generally known to the public, or that has not yet been revealed whether in tangible or intangible form, that is identified as confidential in writing or when disclosed orally.

Confidential information included in the application form must be expressly labelled by the applicant as such in the form. As regards confidential information expressly labelled as such in the call process, EIT Food undertakes to (i) not disclose them in any way and any form, without the prior written authorization of the applicant; and (ii) not to use them for purposes other than those strictly necessary for participation in the call.

Confidential information may be shared among EIT Food and its subsidiaries (e.g. KIC Co-Location Centres) solely for the purposes of the call process. EIT Food undertakes to impose this confidentiality obligation on its employees and the employees of its subsidiaries and its collaborators, as well as on independent experts and all subjects who, by virtue of participating in the conduct of the call, including as members of the Evaluation Committee, may have access to such confidential data and information.

The applicants agree that data and information regarding the selected projects' implementation (e.g. success stories) not labelled as confidential may be disclosed in connection with the activities of EIT Food.

#### 5. Avoidance of conflict of interest

EIT Food is committed to ensure the avoidance of conflict of interest (regarding all actors) and comply with the principles of transparency, non-discrimination and sound financial management.

Measures to avoid potential Conflict of Interest or unequal treatment of applicants are ensured including through appropriate conflict of interest declaration and assessment process, established written communication channels and independent and fair complaints/redress procedures.

In case an applicant becomes aware of a potential conflict of interest affecting the conduct of the call process, it shall notify the EIT Food of the conflict of interest without any delay.

#### 6. Ethics and values

The proposal must comply with:

- ethical principles (including the highest standards of research integrity) and
- applicable EU, international and national law, including the Charter of Fundamental Rights of the European Union and the European Convention for the Protection of Human Rights and Fundamental Freedoms and its Supplementary Protocols.

No financial support/EIT funding can be granted, within or outside the EU, for activities that are prohibited in all Member States. No financial support/EIT funding can be granted in a Member State for an activity which is forbidden in that Member State.

## 7. Intellectual property rights

Applicants retain full and exclusive ownership of their prior information and intellectual property rights. By submitting their application, applicants affirm that they hold ownership or have legally secured the right to use all elements of the innovative product or service included in their application.

Applicants agree to indemnify and hold harmless EIT Food and/or any assignee or affiliate from any third-party allegations or claims of intellectual property rights infringement by the product or service of applicants. Applicants shall have the right to further develop, use and license their intellectual property rights for creating, making, marketing, and distributing products, services, and technology. Applicants agree to respect the IPR (Intellectual Property Rights) Rules (Article 16) of the [General Model Grant Agreement](#) and Article 10 of the Financial Support Agreement (Common Subgrant Agreement Model).

## 8. Withdrawal of the funding – Recovery of undue amounts

EIT Food may withdraw the funding after its award and recover all payments made in line with the provisions of the [Financial Support Agreement](#), including in the following cases:

- in case the applicant committed substantial errors, irregularities or fraud;
- in case the applicant committed serious breach of obligations under the Financial Support Agreement or during its award (including non-compliance with the call conditions, submission of false information, failure to provide required information, etc.)
- it is established that the awarded applicants were not eligible or should have been excluded.

## 9. Checks, reviews, audits and investigations

EIT Food retains the right to initiate checks, reviews and audit on an applicant that has been awarded funding, in order to verify compliance with the requirements of the call conditions and of the legal and contractual framework referred to above.

EIT Food may request any information and data from applicants that have been awarded funding for 5 years after completion for these purposes, as well as in relation to monitoring by the EIT.

In accordance with the Grant Agreement between the EIT and the KIC as well as the Financial Support Agreement, the EIT and/or the Commission, the European Anti-Fraud Office (OLAF), the European Public Prosecutor's Office (EPPO) and the Court of Auditors may carry out checks, reviews, audits and investigations in relation to the call and the implementation of the projects.

## 10. Applicable law

The present call is governed by the applicable European Union legal framework(i.e. in particular the [EIT Regulation](#)<sup>13</sup>, the [EU Financial Regulation](#)<sup>14</sup>, the [Horizon Europe Regulation](#)<sup>15</sup>), supplemented if necessary by the national law of Belgium.

The applicants agree to observe the obligations outlined in the Partnership Agreement and the Grant Agreement signed between the EIT and EIT Food. Applicants agree to comply with the terms of the Model Financial Support Agreement between successful applicants and EIT Food, available [here](#).

## 11. Settlement of disputes

All disputes arising out of or in connection with this Agreement, which cannot be solved amicably, shall be finally settled before the courts of Brussels.
