Your Legal Rights When Voting in California

Your voting site may have a language interpretation phone number posted. If not, you can reach the Secretary of State's hotline by calling (800) 345-8683.



You can bring up to two people to assist you at the polls. For example, they can help you check in or translate the ballot for you. They cannot be your employer or union representative.



Your voting site may have translated materials available in your language. You can reach out to your county elections office for more information.



If needed, you can vote without getting out of your car. There should be a sign posted outside your voting site with instructions. It might say something like "Curbside Voting HERE".

Know Your Rights

Every voter in California registered by May 18 will receive a ballot in the mail. Here's how to cast your vote.

Election Day is Tuesday, June 2. Polls will be open from 7:00 am until 8:00 pm.

Drop it Off



You can drop your ballot off at a secure county elections drop box. You can return your ballot until 8pm on Election Day.

Vote by Mail



If you vote by mail, your ballot must be postmarked by Election Day and received by your local elections office no later than June 9. Due to recent USPS procedural changes, we suggest you mail in your ballot at least one week in advance.

Vote In Person



Early in-person voting is available in many counties. If you vote in-person on Election Day, you must be in line at the polls by 8pm.
