

# Know Your Voting Rights - San Francisco

California's 2024 General Election - November 5, 2024

## Get Ready

If you are already registered to vote, visit [voterstatus.sos.ca.gov](https://voterstatus.sos.ca.gov) to make sure all of your information is correct. If you're registered by Monday, October 21, you will receive your ballot in the mail. After October 21, you must go to SF City Hall or polling place to get your ballot. **The polling place for most Chinatown residents will be the lobby of CCSF - Chinatown/North Beach Center (808 Kearny St).**

## Option 1 - Vote by Mail

You can return the ballot **by mail**. No postage needed! Fill out your ballot, place it in the provided envelope, sign, date, and seal the envelope. Make sure it is *postmarked* by November 5.



## Option 2 - Drop it Off

Drop off your ballot at any polling place in SF before 8 p.m. on Election Day.

You can look up polling places near you on the SF Department of Elections website at [https://sfelections.org/tools/map\\_poll\\_time/](https://sfelections.org/tools/map_poll_time/).

You can deposit your ballot in a secure **drop box**. Drop boxes will be available starting Tuesday, October 7. You can find drop box locations at <https://www.sf.gov/return-your-ballot>.



## Option 3 - Vote in Person (whether you received a ballot in the mail or not)

If you prefer to vote in person, you can! To make the process as easy as possible, take the ballot you received in the mail with you to turn in (if you received one).

Election Day is Tuesday, November 5, 2024. Polls will be open from 7 a.m. to 8 p.m. As long as you are in line by 8 p.m., you will be able to cast your vote. You can also vote at SF City Hall October 7 through Election Day.

If you vote at your polling place, find the main table and give the poll workers your name and address. If you prefer voting in a language other than English, ask if they have any materials in that language and if any of the poll workers speak that language.
