CAFÉ BACKGROUND

- Launched in August 2024 in Chinatown, Chicago.
- Serve mostly Chinese American with limited English proficiency.
- Identified a gap in Chinese-speaking Memory Café
- Family and PLWD expressed needs for meaningful, culturally relevant activities to stay active and connected



CAFÉ BACKGROUND

Started with Questions:

- **Cultural Fit:** Would the memory cafe concept resonate with our community? How to make it appealing and non-stigmatizing?
- **Sustainability:** Volunteers, participants recruitment, marketing, funding
- **Implementation:** Venue, time



— LOCATION & VENUE



- **Accessibility:** Public transportation, parking, ADA compliance.
- **Welcoming Atmosphere:** Open to the public, comfortable, and familiar.
- **Consistency:** Ability to use the space monthly without disruption.
- **Cost:** Affordable or free options to ensure sustainability.

— LOCATION & VENUE

Our Solution: CASL Building

Located in the heart of Chinatown, Chicago.

Pros:

- Near public transit (bus stops, Red Line).
- Adjacent to Adult Day Service Center.
- ADA-compliant & familiar to existing CASL clients.

Challenges:

- Less open to the public compared to libraries.
- Limited parking (street parking only).

Expanding Reach: Quarterly Memory Cafes at Senior Building



POPULATION SERVED



Population We Serve:

Primarily individuals living with dementia attending CASL's Adult Day Service (ADS).

Range from early to late stages of dementia.

Diverse languages: Cantonese, Toishanese, Mandarin.

No diagnosis required



Creating a Welcoming Environment:

Games on tables while waiting.

Refreshments served in a casual setting.

Volunteers assigned to each table (ratio of 1:3).

Activities centered around familiar themes (e.g., Chinese traditional festivals)



Attendance:

Average of 10-15 participants

AGENDA OF CAFE

Common Agenda:

- 5-10 Minutes: Arrival
 - Participants arrive and settle in.
 - Volunteers greet and engage them with table games (puzzles, mazes, word searches).
- 5-10 Minutes: Light Exercise - Opening
 - Activities like Tai Chi, chair yoga, or stretching.
- 25-30 Minutes: Main Art Activity
 - Avoid large group conversations due to cultural factors, cognitive level, and avoiding language barriers.
- 10 Minutes: Closing Activity
 - Group activities like bingo or sing-along.
 - Flexibility to skip for more time to wind down and prepare to leave.

AGENDA OF CAFE

Cultural Considerations:

- Activities themed around traditional Chinese festivals.
- Incorporation of Tai Chi for light exercise.
- Art activities designed to bridge language and cognitive barriers.



Financial Sustainability

- Funding from ACL
- Funding from IDPH

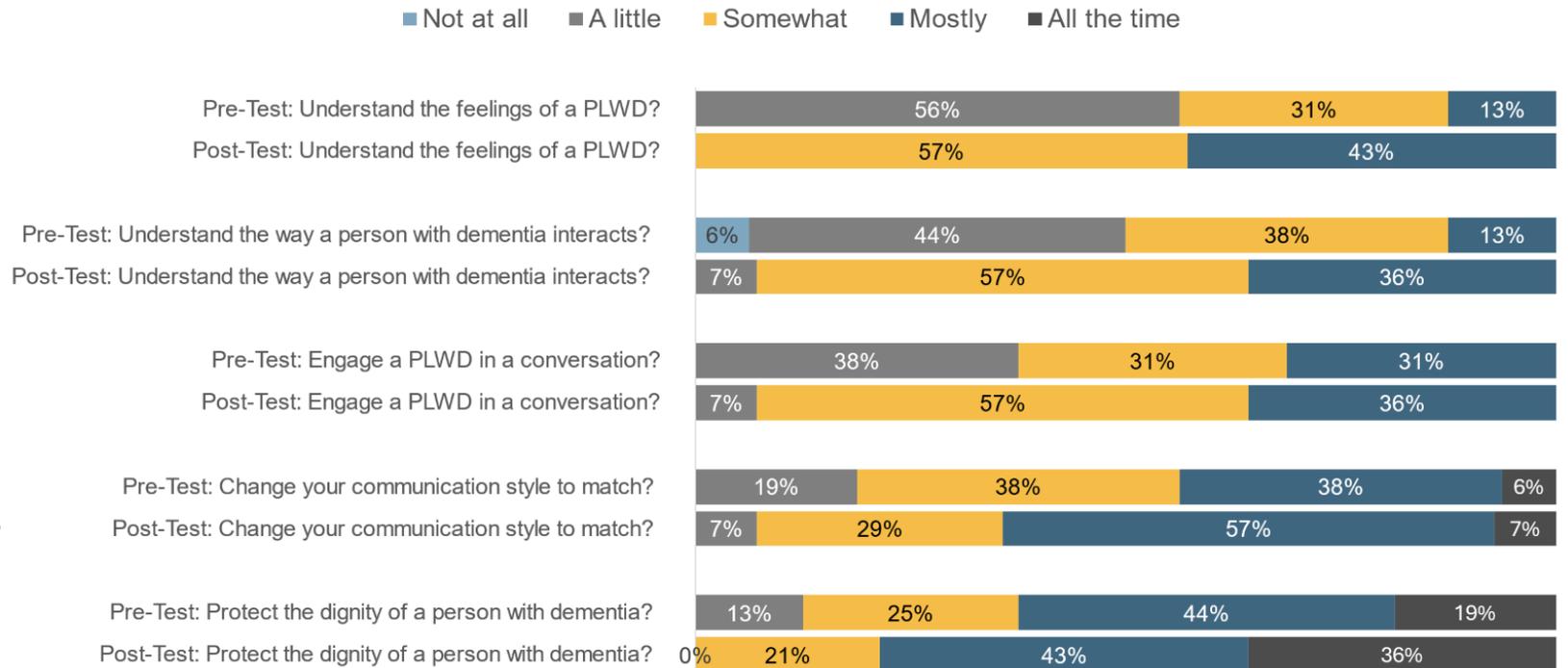

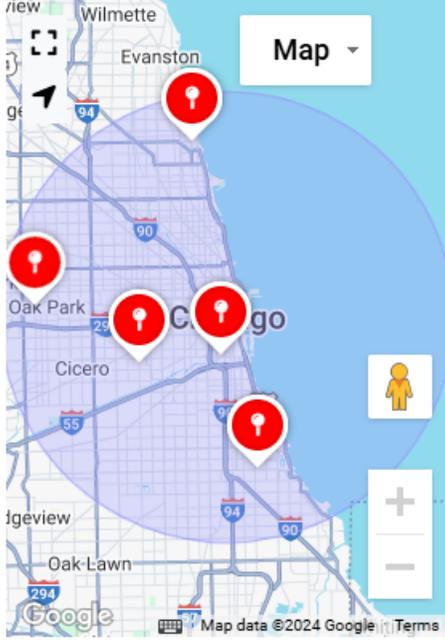

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Three Pathways for Starting New Memory Cafés

- Individual self-directed pathway
- Group self-directed pathway
- Cohort pathway

Individual Self-Directed Pathway

- This is how most of you started your Memory Café!
- Go at your own pace through the training modules, and other resources
- You could ask your colleagues, volunteers, guest facilitators to to create a profile and use the module(s) at their own pace...or share your screen and go through them together at a “live” training



Group self-directed pathway

- Organized/led by experienced Memory Café Leader
- Useful in a specific sector or other group, e.g. a library system
- Live meetings wrap around self-paced training modules
- May obtain grant funding
- Encourage allocating some funds to support Dementia Friendly America's infrastructure



Cohort/Expert Trainer Pathway

- Supported by philanthropy: potentially federal, state or regional funder
- Organized and facilitated by philanthropy or a “Training Hub”
- Includes funds for Café Leader Trainee, Training Hub, and Dementia Friendly America infrastructure
- Live meetings wrap around self-paced training modules; suggest a 5-month process with a curriculum



Training Hubs

- Could be the “engine” to engage more geographic areas, communities, and sectors!
- Training Hubs require expertise in community engagement, adult learning, and Memory Cafes
- Pilots are in development and will draft a curriculum



Learning Community

- Percolator continues to host Google Group and idea exchanges
- Toolkit and other resources still available for download. Content has been integrated into Training Modules
- Anticipate an evolution of learning community as new resources come online
- Encourage all “Memory Café people” anywhere in the world to participate!

Why a public awareness campaign?

- Percolator participants have identified outreach and attendance as their #1 challenge for the past 10 years
- More people would start Memory Cafes if they became aware of the model
- Spreading the word about Memory Cafes can focus attention on ways to live well with dementia and thereby reduce stigma

Phase 1 (begins now!)

Focus: Get the word out to colleagues and collaborating organizations about the Memory Café directory and training modules

- Share the Promo Video
- Share the Press Release
- Share Social Media Announcement
- Share One-Pagers
- MCA lead team is working on webinars, podcasts, press interviews

What is a Memory Cafe?

Memory Cafes are a place where people experiencing cognitive challenges, along with caring family members, friends and professional caregivers, can find meaningful programming, friendship, and acceptance. No diagnosis is needed to attend.

Cognitive challenges like dementia can bring feelings of isolation and loneliness, which research tells us can create additional health challenges. Memory Cafes are an easy, low-cost way to reduce feelings of isolation. They commonly meet monthly, are run by a trained facilitator, and meet in welcoming spaces like libraries, senior centers, or arts and culture settings. While most are free, some ask for a small fee to support programming.

Are There Memory Cafes Near Me?

You will find a user-friendly national directory at memorycafedirectory.com. Just enter your zip code and how far you are willing to travel, and it will provide a list of nearby Memory Cafes. You are also able to create a PDF of the list that you can print out or email to another person.

How Can I Start a Memory Cafe?

Hosted by Dementia Friendly America, Memory Cafe Alliance (MCA) strives to increase the quantity, quality, and sustainability of Memory Cafes. MCA created a new, simple (and free!) online training for you to learn how to start and run your own Cafe and a Learning Community for ongoing peer support as you continue to grow and shape your cafe.

Where Do I Begin?

- 1 Visit DFA's website and create an account.
- 2 Join the Learning Community
- 3 Take the self-directed, 3 module, online training.
- 4 Complete the short knowledge check
- 5 List your Memory Cafe on the directory and update as needed
- 6 Consider donating to support keeping these tools free

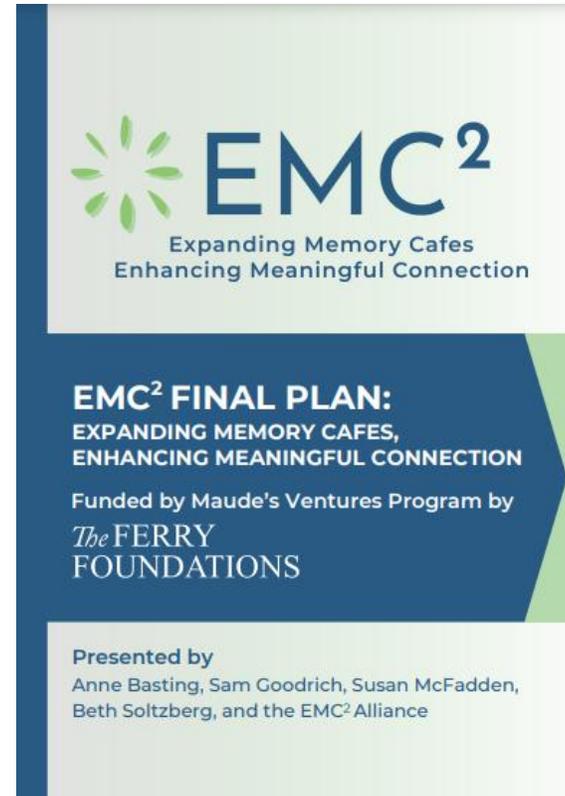
